George Lloyd was a graduate of the Boston Museum School of Fine
Arts, the New England School of Design and a member of the New York Art Students League. He had

For the past 20 years, he had been an artist of note, living in the Monadnock Region. He was a member of the New Hampshire League man shows at the Currier Gallery of Art in Manchester, LaMont Ga1leries at Phillips Exeter Academy in Exeter, Worcester Art Museum and the Brooklyn (N.Y.) Art Mas media, including oils, gouache and ceramics. He was well known in New Hampshire art circles for his wood scupture, in artistic harmony with the natural grain of the wood itself.
