This is a letter which exposes Sen. Flanders hypocrisy around campaign finance reform. I feel he took advantage of local sentiment toward you when he made campaign finance reform a key platform plank in 2000. This letter is written by someone from NH Citizens Alliance.

Letter to the Editor  
(March 23, 2002)

To the Editor:

I write to set the record straight on state Sen. Robert Flanders' support for campaign finance reform. Senator Flanders has taken every opportunity afforded him in the NH Senate to vote against campaign finance reform. In fact, Sen. Flanders has voted to undermine the effectiveness of the state's campaign receipt and expenditure reporting requirements, which have been among the best in the country.

Senator Flanders does not support reform. He voted against regulating unlimited donations from Political Action Committees (PACs) to candidates. He voted against reinstatement of the state's 88-year ban on direct corporate contributions to candidates, which was struck down in court on a technicality (by contrast, federal law has prohibited corporate contributions to candidates for nearly 100-years). He voted against closing the state's soft money loophole, which allowed more than \$1.2 million in corporate contributions to the state parties and their committees. He voted against a bill that would have initiated a system of public funding for campaigns for the NH Senate, Executive Council and governor (similar initiatives are already working well in Maine, Vermont and Arizona). And he voted to support an amendment that would reduce reporting requirements by campaigns for their expenses and receipts as elections draw near.

Most egregiously, though, at a forum on campaign finance reform - sponsored by the NH Citizens Alliance - Sen. Flanders indicated to the over 100 people in attendance that he supported campaign finance reform efforts. Now that he is an incumbent senator he no longer supports reform.

Senator Flanders sees fit to be a tireless fighter against campaign finance reform. Is this because he believes that people with good ideas and leadership skills - who happen not to have access to wealth - should be prevented from running for public office? Does he really believe that unlimited soft money contributions, direct corporate contributions and unlimited donations from PACs are essential to his and his party's political success?

The people of New Hampshire deserve better. They should be able to have faith that their government lives up to its highest promise - that it is government of the people, for the people and by the people.
